Praise Band News

St. Paul's Praise Band is taking a well deserved break during the four Sundays in July. Worship and Music Committee considered having an organist or pianist play for this service, but we were able to find a praise band on CD that would allow us to continue to sing the same congregational music that our own praise band does every week in our 10:45 Sunday worship. The praise band will be back in full force beginning with the first Sunday in August.

Blood Group—Blood Donors

It has come to our attention that many of our members may not be aware that we have a Blood Donor Group here and that we belong to the Central PA Blood Bank. The Central PA Blood Bank became a Non-Profit Corporation in 1960 but did not become operational until August of 1964. The purpose was to combine all hospital blood donor files into one common file, to recruit blood donor groups and individuals, arrange for the movement of blood between hospitals, handle all paperwork associated with all the above and send donors to hospitals on an as needed basis. Since then it has changed very little but has become more sophisticated. We currently have 13 member hospitals and are responsible for 100% of their blood need. We need the support and cooperation of individuals such as yourself to accomplish this goal.

Donation process: It is a safe and easy process that takes about an hour. As a blood donor, you will be asked to complete a registration form and to read an educational pamphlet about it. You will be registered into the computer system and given a "mini" physical by a technician. You should have a list of all medications you are taking. They will check your iron level to make sure it's high enough for you to donate blood. Providing all is well, a skilled technician will then draw one pint of blood. After the blood is drawn, you'll be asked to rest a few minutes and are given some refreshments. You can donate blood at the Applewood Clinic located behind Orrstown Bank, Stonehedge. From Jan.—March of 2008, 15 people donated blood in St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Carlisle name. That brings our total to 15 pints for the year. If you have any questions about donating blood or how to go about using the blood in St. Paul's name if you would need to while in the hospital, please contact Doris Brion at 486-4470.

Dear Members of Saint Paul,

It is hard for me to believe that my time as Vicar here is coming to a close so soon! What a wonderful year it has been, full of blessings and learning and healing.

Everything I hoped for in my Internship I found here, and more. I wanted to spend some time learning with a congregation that is reaching out in ministry into its community, that has perspective on its past, present and future, that empowers its members young and old, long-term and newcomer, that worships in diverse, meaningful and uplifting ways, that studies the Word, seeks to discern God in the world in every way, and that sees ministry as a team effort of humanity and the Holy Spirit. I have learned with the best!

The Internship ministry at Saint Paul is a great gift not just to your interns, but also to the larger church. I'll take all that I've found here with me into my next parish, into all my duties, and into my heart, and as I move on I will try to share God's love as I found it here.

I found God's love in the listening, in the patient attention to paperwork, and in the constructive criticism I found in the Intern Committee: Don Brion, Mark Ritter, June Reed, Margorie Thumma and Doug Weirich. I found God's love in the opportunity to sing and play a joyful song with choirs and praise bands with some very talented and good hearted folks. I found God's love in the fellowship afforded us by hard working and imaginative cooks and chefs at a hundred gatherings. I found God's love in the wisdom and wonder of Sunday School classes, Bible Studies and countless conversations with Pastor Tim. I found God's love in the service minded efforts of the Saint Paul Staff – what a great group to learn from! I feel like a career minor league catcher that just got to spend a year with the Yankees (please try to cherish their efforts and insights!). Most of all though, I found God's enduring and abiding love in the lives of you all, some of God's people, as you minister to one another here, as you reach out to neighbors, as you worship in the midst of going about your interesting and diverse daily lives.

It is an Intern's duty to learn all this, to internalize it, and then to move on. I have to get out of the way so the next intern can have this opportunity to learn and serve, so the congregation members can be in a good and full relationship with their current pastors and student pastor. That means that I'll be scarce. This summer I have to focus on new tasks: I am headed off to work for the Air Force Reserve for a few months, for the most part down in Virginia, with a week of fun up at Camp Nawakwa, and then in the Fall I have one more semester of studies at the Seminary in Gettysburg. Edie, Jay, Sarah and I plan to stay in Gettysburg until the end of the next school year for the kids, and I'll probably wait on a call until the summer, working for the Air Force in Washington DC in the Spring. Come a year from now, we'll see where the Spirit takes us. I'd wager that we'll be somewhere in the Northwest, but God only knows!

We have found so much of God's love here, but we abide in knowing that God is with us always as we live in freedom to roam. Saint Paul wrote these words at the end of the eighth chapter of his letter to the

Romans: "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor thing present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." The Lutheran Church that bears his name in Carlisle also bears out the wisdom of his words and deeds, for I will always carry that love I found here with me.

From the New Vicar

Hi! I wanted to take a few moments to introduce myself. My name is Terry McCarthy and I will be the intern and vicar here at St. Paul's for the next year, beginning on Monday July 14th. I am excited to begin this year of learning and experiencing parish ministry with Pastor Tim as my supervisor. I feel very blessed to have this opportunity. So, the first thing I'd like to do is thank all of you at St. Paul's for providing and for supporting an internship experience for students at the seminary. Although, in the course of this year I hope to be a vital part of the pastoral team here and to provide ministry to the members of this community, I'm sure that I will learn and receive far from more from each of you and from this experience than I could ever hope to offer. Therefore I am certainly eager to begin this year as we prepare to journey together.

I have completed three years of study at the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg, so this internship is one of the final parts in my journey towards ordained ministry. I was born and raised in the Roman Catholic faith tradition in Central New Jersey and then later in Suburban New York State, just a bit northwest of New York City. The practice of our faith, attending mass and praying together as a family was at the center of our family's life, as I was growing up. My parents were active as volunteers in our parish and in our community. Their commitment to living out their faith through service to others continues to be a guiding example and an inspiration to me. My mother passed away about 15 years ago, but my father is now an ordained deacon in the Catholic Church and continues to live out his vocation of service.

As a young person I felt a call to ministry and after high school I spent a challenging year in A Catholic seminary community, but I left knowing "it just wasn't right for me." Remaining committed to helping others in some professional manner; I continued my studies and after college, began a fifteen year career as an Occupational Therapist. Much of that time was spent treating children at risk for disabilities. I lived and worked in those years in upstate New York and in western New York. In those years at the beginning of my career I attended church less regularly and my faith was more in the background of my life than it had been while I was growing up. I also married shortly after college, and a painful separation and divorce of that marriage turned me once again to my faith for personal renewal and consolation. At that time, though I realized that I disagreed with the Roman Catholic hierarchy related to the issue of divorce and on the structure of the church and on other issues as well.

It was at this time that I moved to West Virginia to teach in an Occupational Therapy Program. I met and began dating Susan, who I later married and as that relationship became serious, I remember her turning to me one day and asking "Why is it that for the first time in my life, I'm dating someone whose faith is important to them, as it is to me and neither one of us goes to church?" Reflecting on that powerful question led us to begin attending St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Beckley West Virginia. We quickly became active in that very loving and welcoming congregation with the help of Pastor Wanda Childs who was excellent at recognizing the gifts of individuals and at encouraging them to put them into action. We both became members and taught Sunday School, and it was through these activities and relationships that both Susan and I began to reflect on each of our calls to ministry, which we had both pushed to the back of our minds over the years.

After only being married two years and while still owners of our home in West Virginia, Susan and I moved to Gettysburg for her to begin full- time study towards ordained ministry at The Lutheran Theological Seminary in Gettysburg. I worked full- time as a Therapist at York Hospital, and then after our home in WV finally sold, I began full- time study myself at LTSG in August of 2005. We have had a busy few years to say the least. Susan graduated, and was ordained and called as the pastor of Bender's Lutheran Church in Biglerville P.A. in the summer of 2006. Just a few months later, our son Luke Benjamin was born. Luke was adopted. We were introduced to his birthmother, when she was only 5 weeks away from her due date. However, Luke had other plans; he arrived a month early and only three days after our initial conversation with his birthmother! Despite the initial shock that we were suddenly becoming parents and the large amount of legal and logistical arrangements that needed to be made, the adoption continued and he is now a very active and happy 18 month old toddler. I continued my studies at LTSG and have enjoyed working as a supply preacher on many Sundays in churches in the area.

As you may be able to tell from this introduction, I strongly believe in the value and power of sharing our stories with one another. I could have rattled off facts about myself more concisely but I believe it is in sharing our stories that we truly get to know one another and experience God's presence in one another. I very much look forward to meeting all of you, to hearing your stories and learning how God has been present in your lives.

Report of the 2008 Lower Susquehanna Synod Assembly

Along with Pastor Tim and Mary Jane Keller, I had the opportunity to attend the 21st annual Lower Susquehanna Synod Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) held on June 12 – 14, 2008, at Messiah College, in Grantham, Pennsylvania. A total of 771 people participated in the assembly including 666 voting members. The assembly's theme "Living in God's Amazing Grace: Faithful and Bold" was expressed throughout worship, presentations, debates, and displays.

I will very briefly summarize some of the assembly's highlights. A complete set of the assembly minutes will be available in the future at the church office.

Thursday evening forums...

More than 350 people attended Thursday evening informational sessions on synod ministries ranging from global mission to youth ministry, to Lutheran disaster response, to vocational discernment.

Keynote Speaker and Bible Study Leader...

The Rev. Robert Rimbo, bishop-elect of the Metropolitan New York Synod, told the assembly that the Gospel statement is an open statement of all God has done for the world. God sent into the world Jesus Christ, the image of God and the final Adam, the one true human being. The Gospel is all about our dying and rising with Christ, our becoming a new creation. With the same spirit, God sends us, warts and all, to reflect God to one another and to the world. Don't underestimate the treasure that God has given for you to share. Nothing can compare to the power of God.

Synod elections...

Elections were held for open positions on Synod Council for two clergy positions, two lay female positions, and one lay male position. Also, an election for two lay female board members for Gettysburg Seminary was held. In addition, elected were churchwide assembly voting members to include four clergy at large representatives, lay female at large representatives and lay male at large representatives.

Assembly action...

Referred to this synod's Church in Society Committee a resolution asking that our synod intentionally address the issues of racism and ethnicity and identify resources to facilitate conversations around these issues.

Amended and adopted a request from the York Conference asking Diakon Lutheran Social Ministries to address by September 30, 2008, concerns about the large compensation packages of its top executives.

Adopted a request made by Union Lutheran Church in York, to convey to the Northeastern Iowa Synod our prayers, our concerns, and our financial support for them during the crisis following unprecedented flooding throughout the state.

Delayed the election of a synod treasurer until 2009 to ensure that the financial matters are in proper order before the start of a new treasurer.

Recognition of good and faithful servants...

The assembly honored 12 professional church leaders who have served the Lutheran church for fifty years - Sister Barbara Slavinski, Red Lion, PA; the Reverend Donald McDowell Bohn, Greencastle, PA; the Reverend Marshall H. How can we deny the needs of our Homeless Guests? The Guests face extreme difficulties everyday and our ministry feels we need to show God's Love in whatever way He sees fit! The CARES guests do like to come to St. Paul's because they feel they are treated with respect and dignity here. We feel all Human Beings deserve that whatever their circumstances may be!

C.A.R.E.S. can still use donations of toiletry items (especially men's and women's deodorant, foot powder, etc.), food items (peanut butter and cheese crackers pkg's, granola bars, juice boxes, instant decaf. coffee, ice tea, coffee cups, etc.), men's and woman's socks. International Church of Copenhagen

June 10, 2008

Grace and peace to you all, beloved of ICC!

It is a joy to call us together as a community of faith to speak about the path that lies ahead for ICC. Over the course of 47 years, ICC was born, has matured, and is ready to endeavor a new stage in our life together, our ministry in Copenhagen, and to the world. I want to take a brief moment to share with you a bit about where we've come, so that we can understand our current reality, and catch a glimpse of where we are heading.

ICC was constituted in 1961 by the American Lutheran Church (ALC), as The American Lutheran Church in Copenhagen. We began in coordination with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Denmark (ELCD), as an English language ministry to Americans who were a growing population in Copenhagen after World War II. Over the next twenty years we grew to be a place of hospitality and home for people from all over the world who were seeking an English language community of faith. The congregation transitioned from a congregation of American Lutherans, to an international group of Christians from dozens of church denominations. Around the same time, the Lutheran Church in America evolved into its current form, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), which merged the previous Lutheran mission organizations into the new Global Mission Unit. At that time, the American Lutheran Church of Copenhagen made a faithful change to and became "The International Church in Copenhagen" to reflect our evolving identity and mission in Copenhagen. In order to reflect our new relationship with the ELCA, the ELCD and our emerging ecumenical identity, we adapted our constitution. Since that time, what a journey we have made! ICC is a body of Christians from over 20 nations, and at least half as many Christian denominations that proclaims the healing unity of God in Christ Jesus. And now, a decade later, we are looking to a new phase in our growth and development.

The ELCA has been realigning its financial commitments, and is striving to give more of its financial support to emerging churches and churches in conflict areas, specifically, churches in Africa, the Middle East and South America. The ELCA asked ICC and their international church ministries around the world to move towards financial independence in order to facilitate this faithful stewardship of limited finances. Over the course of several years, ICC has made positive steps in this direction.

We look to this year as the time to embrace the reality of independent financial sustainability, as a sign of the next stage of our growth. While we remain constituted as a ministry of the ELCA, with the security of their full ecclesiastical support in cooperation with the ELCD, we must make the financial and constitutional changes that reflect this current stage of our identity. We are ready for this step, but it will require the time, talents, and financial commitment of all who call ICC home. The Council of ICC wants to invite you to understand our path of financial sustainability at this special congregational meeting.

Let this faithful step be a sign of thanksgiving for all that God has done for us in ICC over the past 47 years. While our membership is transient, the Holy Spirit has been constant in its nourishment of this ministry. God sufficiently sustains us with the gifts that we share in community, and only asks that we sow our gifts so that love can grow in new ways over the next 47! So, let us give thanks for this opportunity to respond to the realities of our growing ministry, trusting in God's sufficiency.

We look forward to your presence at this congregational meeting, and we look forward to the future of our life and ministry together in ICC.
